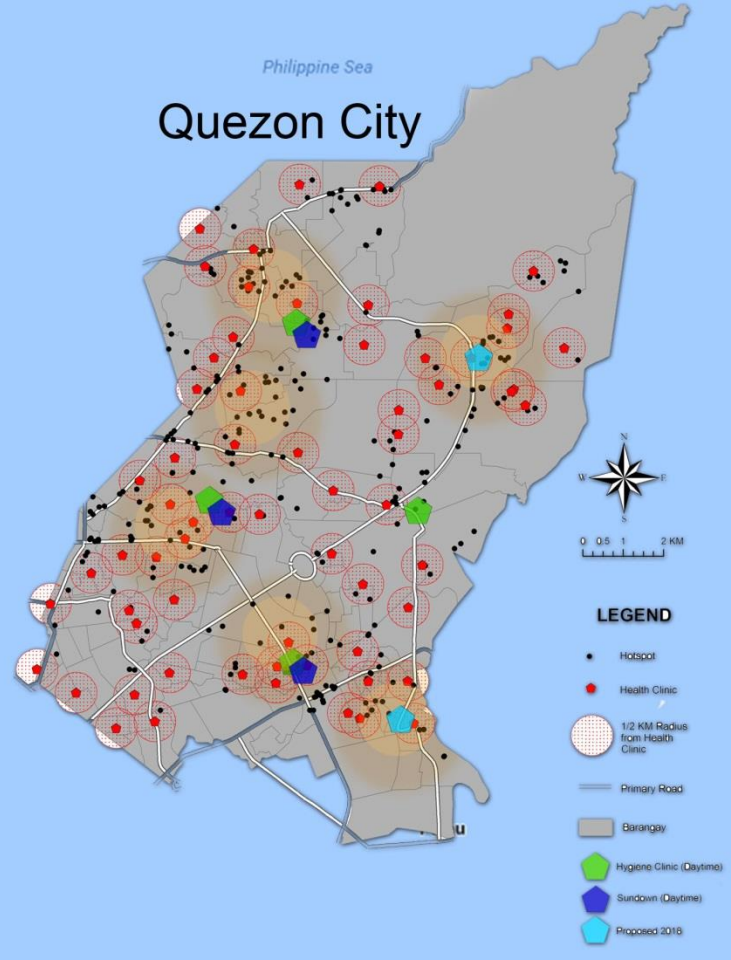

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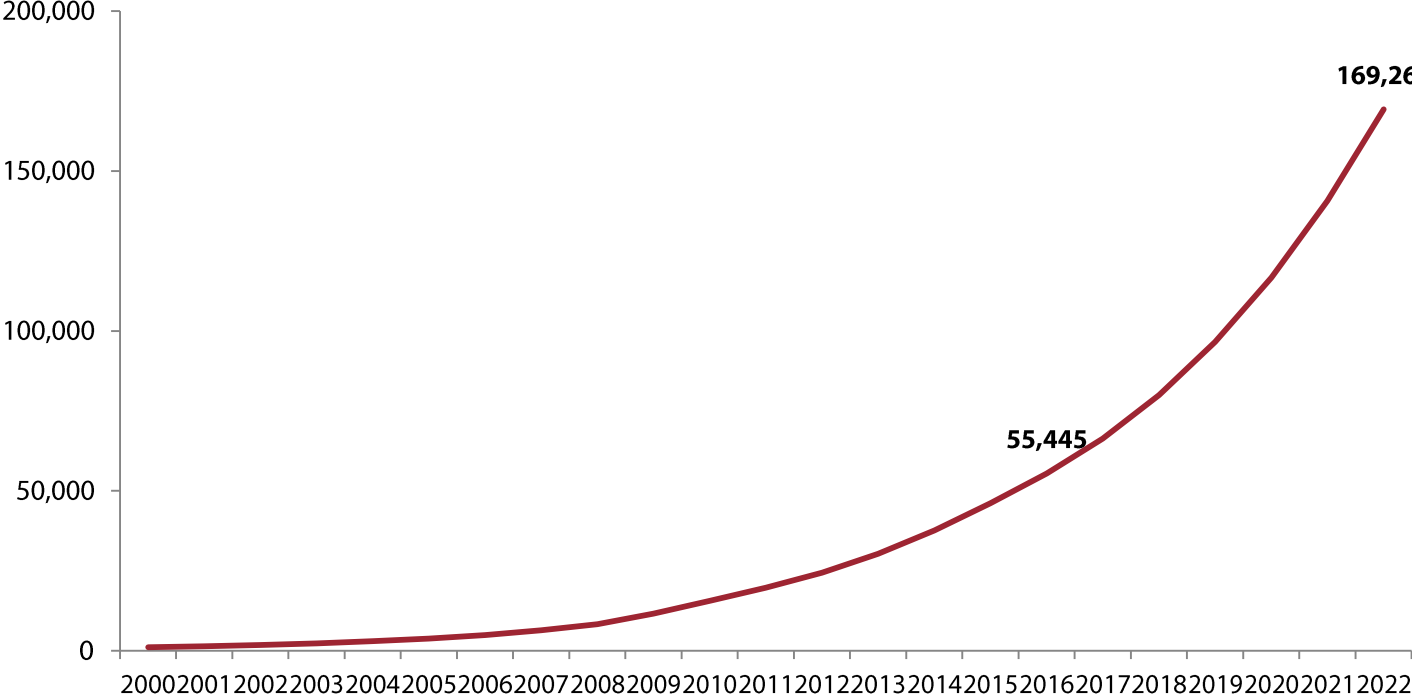

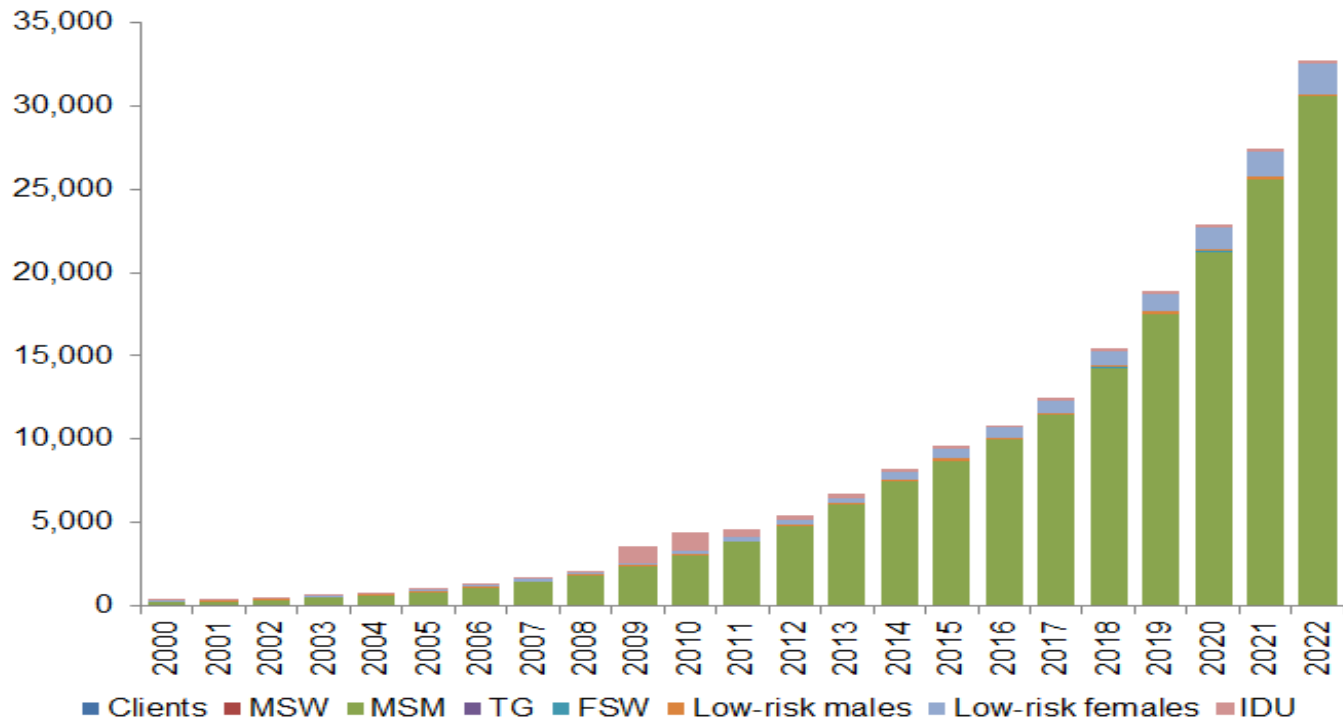
Philippines, 2000-2022

Spectrum Projections 2017



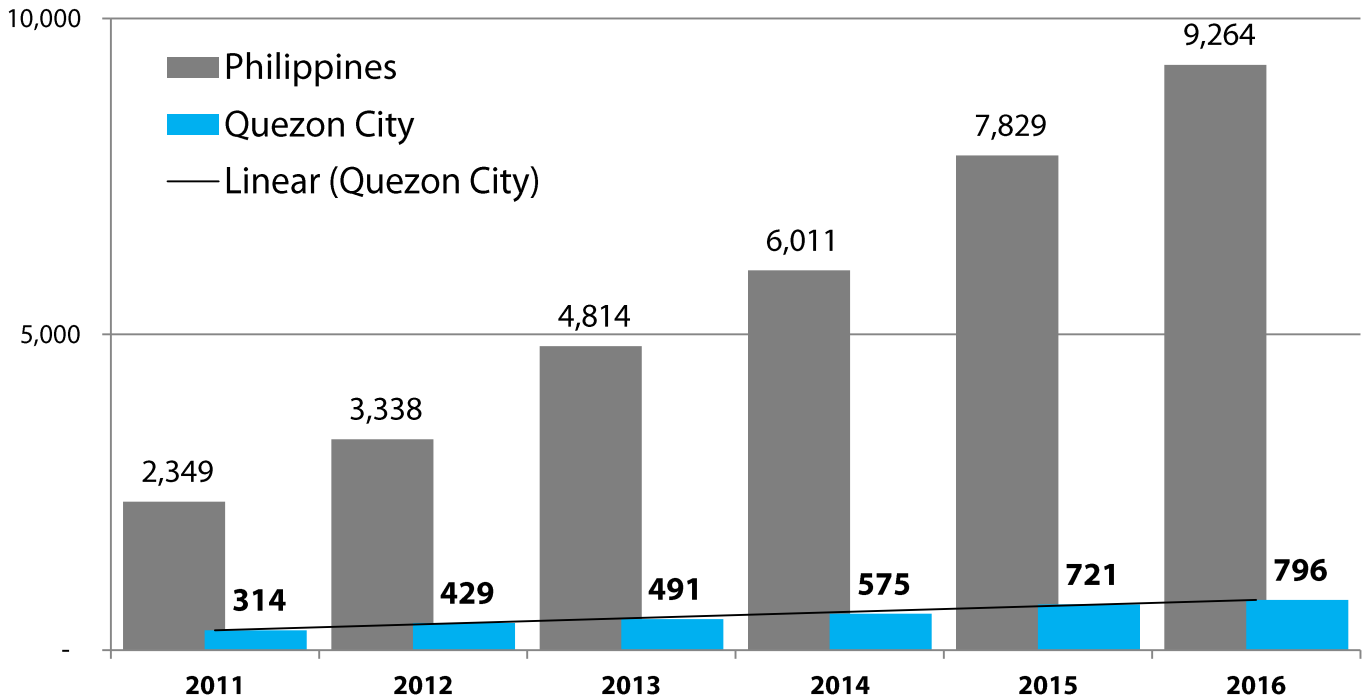

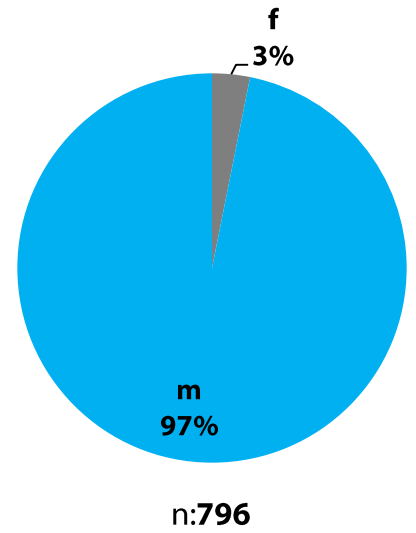
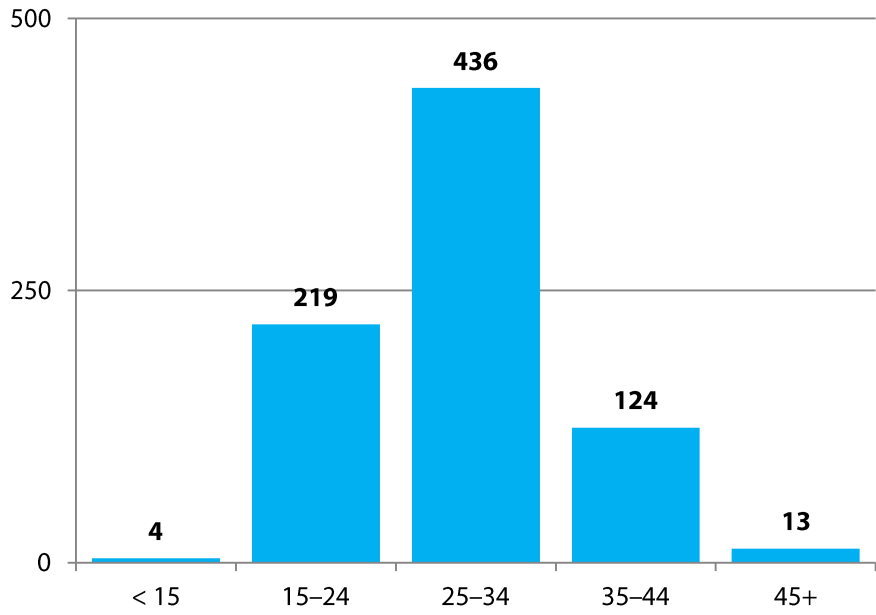
HIV and ART Registry, 2016

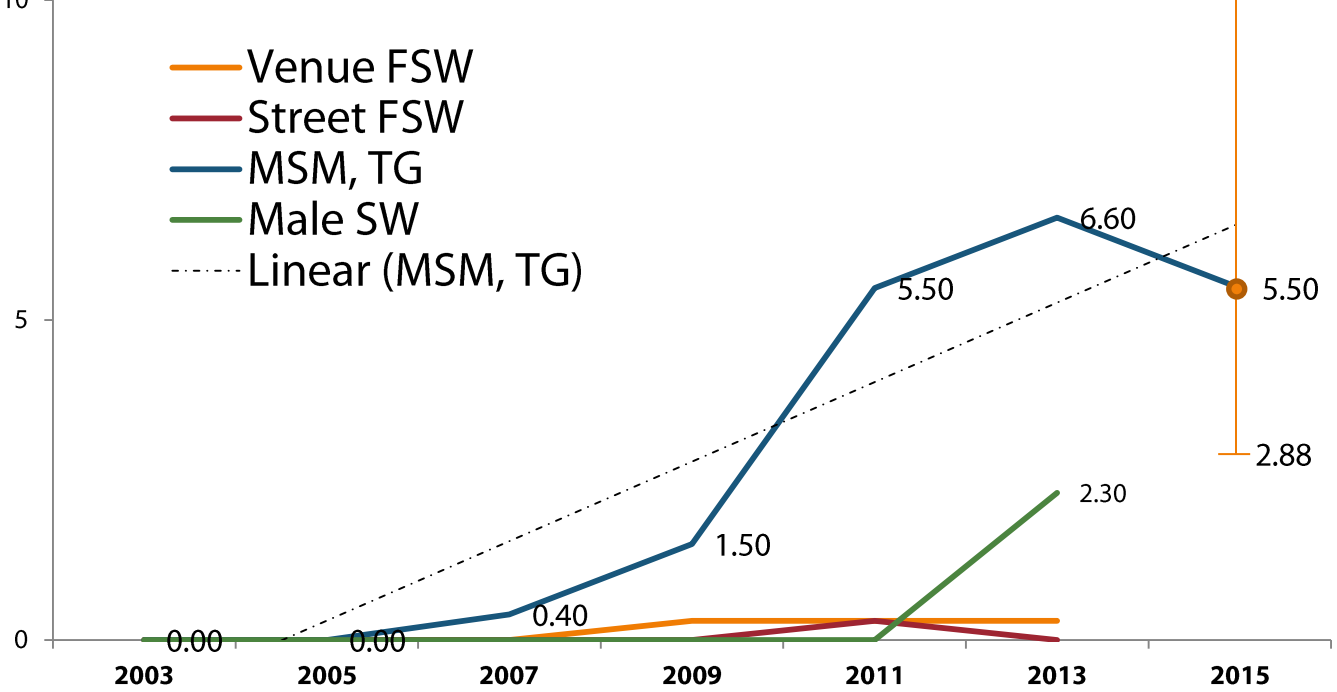

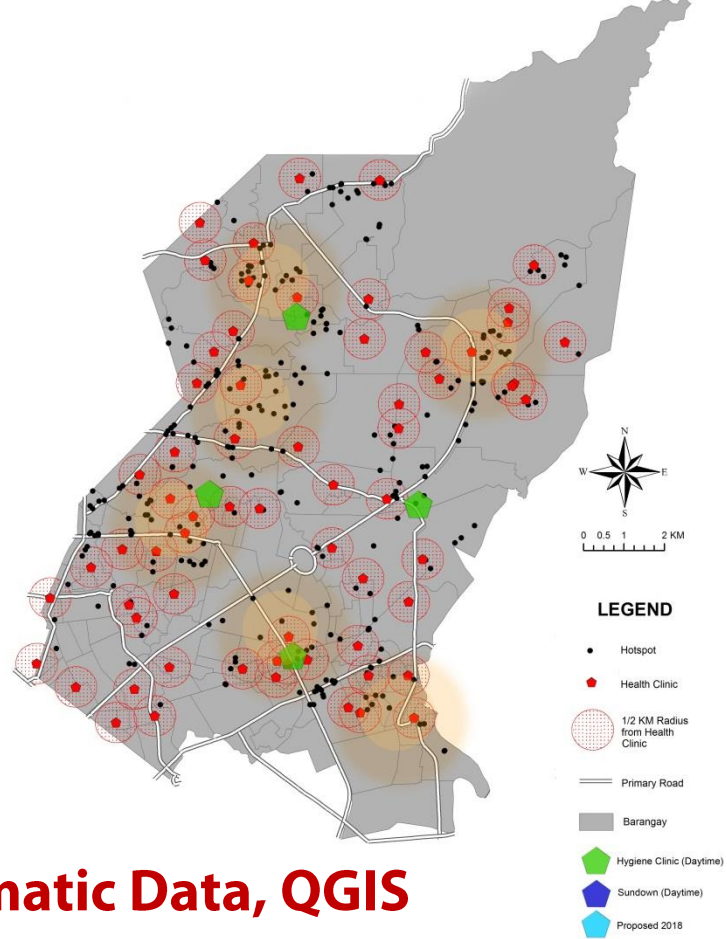

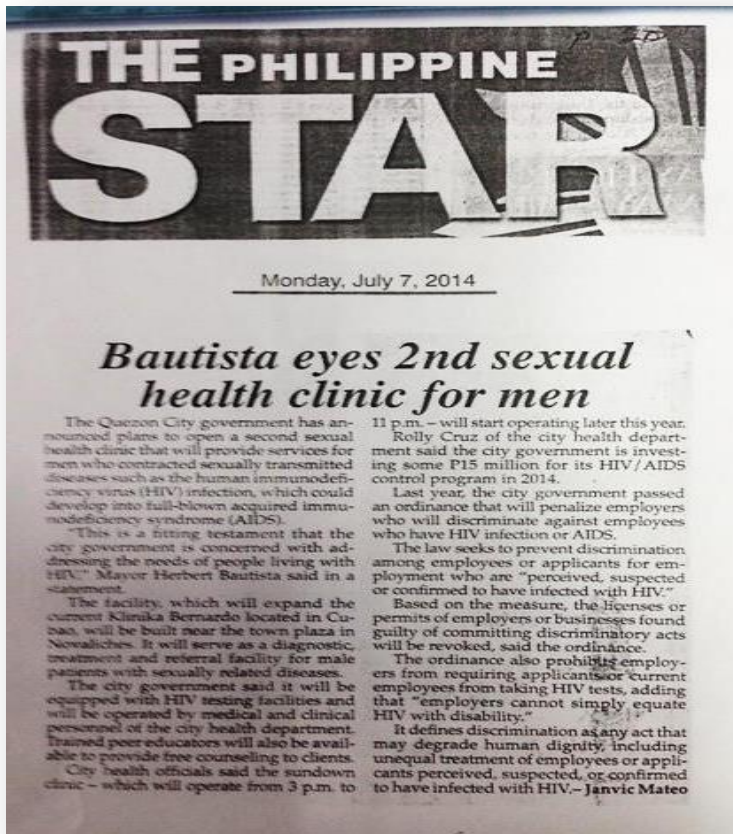

WHEREAS, the Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) is a condition that recognizes no territorial, social, political and economic boundaries for which there is no known cure. The gravity of the AIDS threat demands strong State action today, thus, the Quezon City Government shall strictly adhere to the following local, national and international policies and principles:

IMPLEMENTING RULES AND REGULATIONS OF ORDINANCE NO SP-2210, S-2013

"AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING ALL FORMS OF DISCRIMINATION OF WORKERS PERCEIVED OR SUSPECTED OR EVEN FOUND TO BE POSITIVELY INFECTED WITH HUMAN IMMUNODEFICIENCY VIRUS (HIV) IN WORKPLACES WITHIN THE TERRITORIAL JURISDICTION OF QUEZON CITY"

RULE I

Preliminary Provisions

Article 1. TITLE- This implementing rules and regulations shall be known as the "Implementing Rules and Regulations of the Anti-discrimination within the Workplace against Persons Perceived or Suspected or Found to be Infected with HIV and AIDS."

Article 2. PURPOSE- Pursuant to Section 8 of Ordinance No SP-2210, S-2013, these Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) is hereby promulgated as a principle and prescribed guidelines, procedures and standards for implementation of Ordinance No SP-2210, S-2013 to facilitate compliance thereto and achieve the intent of the Ordinance.

Article 3. COVERAGE- These Rules and Regulations shall apply to all natural and juridical person, including their representatives and/or agents, operating within the territorial jurisdiction of Quezon City, whether public or private, who undertakes, recruitment, hiring, promoting, training, compensation or any other term, condition or privilege of a person who is an employee or applicant. It shall cover all applicants and employees, regardless of their employment status, including trainees of the aforementioned entities, who are perceived, suspected or confirmed to be infected with HIV or AIDS. *Provided, further,* That the protection, rights and privileges provided for under this Ordinance may also extend to the worker's immediate families and dependents, declared for the purpose of employment benefits, with respect to their access to and benefit from prevention, treatment, care and support measures, their protection and privacy including confidentiality of their HIV-related information and their entitlement to health services.

RULE II

Definition and Construction

Article 4. DEFINITION OF TERMS- For purposes of this Implementing Rules and Regulations, the following words, terms and phrases shall mean and be construed as follows pursuant to Republic Act No 8504:

- 4.1 Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS)** - A condition based on signs, symptoms, infections and cancers associated with the deficiency of the immune system that stems from infection with HIV.
- 4.2 Compulsory HIV Testing-** An HIV testing of a person attended by the lack of consent; lack of consent of the parents or legal guardian when said person is a minor or is insane; or use of physical force, intimidation or any other form of compulsion.

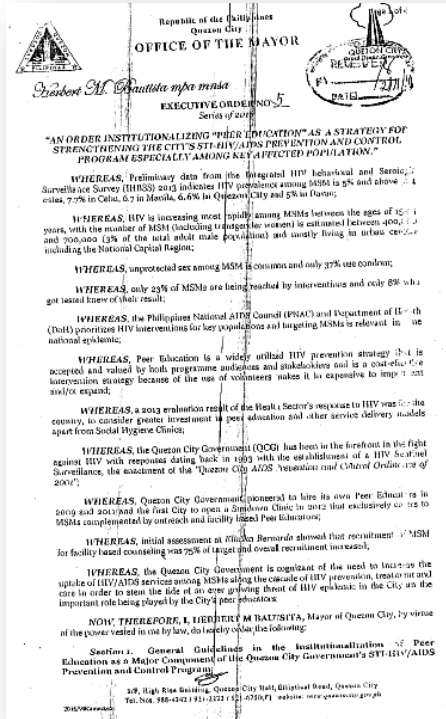

terms. Of the people tested by peer educators in the field, fewer than 50% go back to the facilities for treatment, to count this, satellite treatment hubs are being established.

THE AIDS RESPONSE

Quezon City has taken strong and bold action to understand and respond to the epidemic. Advocacy linked to strategic information has led to increasing local investment, with city administrators leading and funding the HIV response. The 2013 Quezon City Investment Plan for AIDS aims to reach 80-90% of key populations with HIV prevention coverage annually by 2015.

The Saadom Clinic is perhaps the city's most innovative programme. In response to an significant increase in HIV infections among men who have sex with men, the city established a community clinic that operates from the afternoon until late at night to enable people to attend after work. The clinic, Klanka Bernardo, is a comprehensive sexual health-care clinic that provides testing, counselling and treatment for HIV and sexually transmitted infections.

To localise its peer education programme, the city has hired 210 educators who work at night providing outreach, counselling and testing. Access to HIV-related information is now offered online, enabling people to access information in private and on their own

In response to the evidence presented in the Integrated HIV Behavioral and Serological Survey (IHBS), Quezon City is taking extensive action to scale up its HIV response for key populations. A local investment planning was undertaken with stakeholders, including international partners.

The response is being rolled-out and is already showing an increase in the uptake of services. More than double the number of men who have sex with men are being reached.

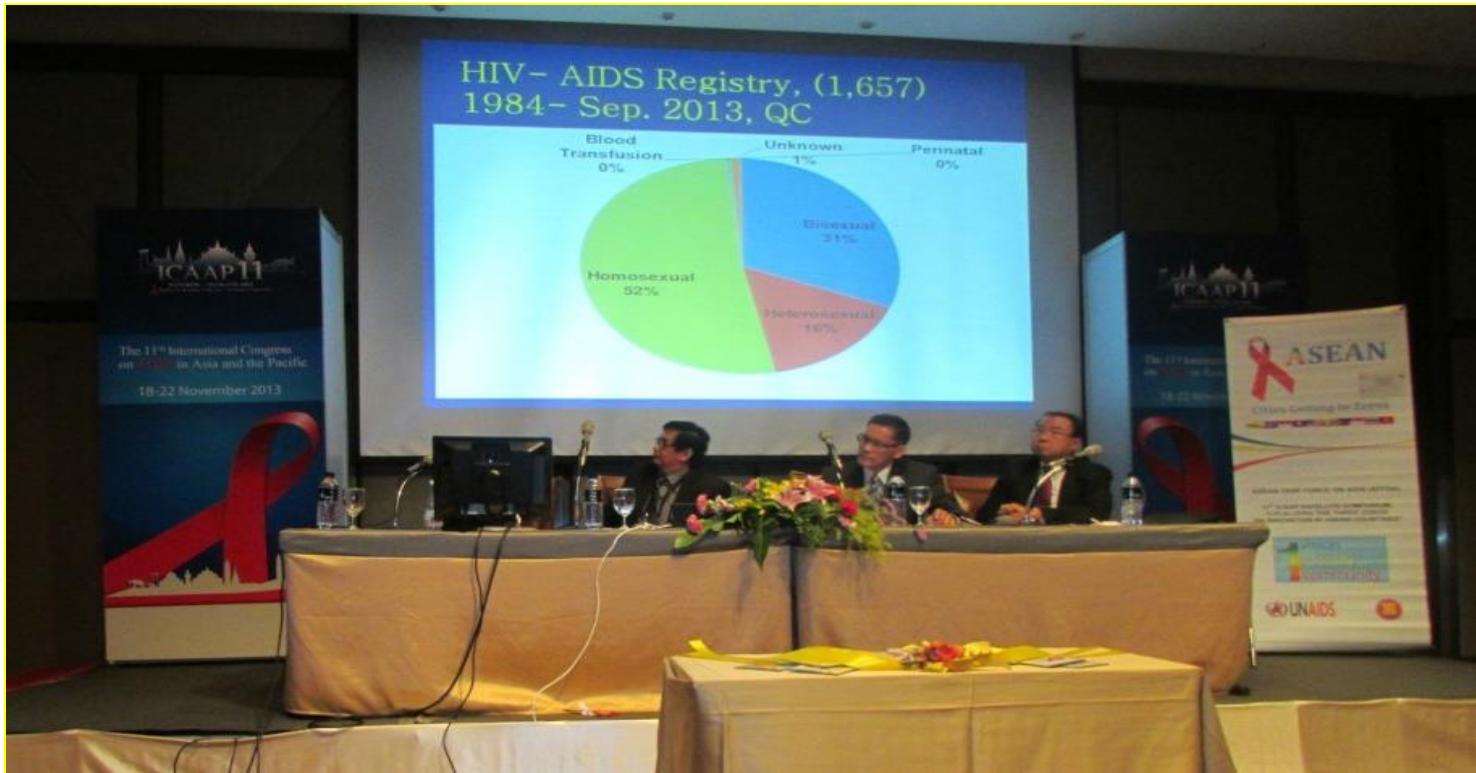
DIS YOU KNOW?

Under the leadership of its Mayor Herbert Bautista, the Quezon City government has worked with local landowners and the private sector to undertake an ambitious housing programme. The government purchased land and managed the building of affordable, decent housing for informal settlers and poorer residents. In that time span of the programme, more than 1,000 housing units have been built.

In recognition of its achievements in the response to HIV, the Quezon City government received the Philippine Galing Pook award for outstanding local governance in 2014 for its socialised housing programme and the pioneering saadom clinic.



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
